New broadcast for Mullaglass Free Presbyterian Church

Although it has proved impossible thus far for LTBS to broadcast on local radio stations in Northern Ireland, opportunities have continued to open for gospel broadcasts to be made on stations in the Republic of Ireland. In recent months, Mullaglass Free Presby-

Radio broadcasts on both sides of the border and has a wide coverage. It can be heard in Newry city itself and the whole surrounding area, including towns like Camlough and Bessbrook. It also reaches locations such as Dundalk and Ardee in the south as well as Dungannon, Portadown, Lurgan, Gilford, Banbridge, and Rathfriland north of the border.

"The Mullaglass congregation had the opportunity last May to broadcast their morning service on BBC Radio Ulster. They were very encouraged by the response they had to that broadcast and decided to explore the possibility of having a regular broadcast made by the church. After some consideration the church committee chose to invest in broadcasting

by means of the radio rather than via the Internet. The reasons for this were the potential of more people being tuned in to hear the message at any one time and also that the radio broadcasts would have more of an impact on the area where the church is located.

"Approaches were then made to Clanrye Radio and also Radio Star Country, both of which broadcast over the Newry area. The response from both stations was positive and encouraging. Because some of our ministers were already broadcasting on Radio Star, it was decided to opt for Clanrye Radio as this would be new ground for the denomination. It is also the local radio

station for the Mullaglass church. The broadcasts themselves will be going out weekly and will be fifteen minutes in length. This will include a nine-minute gospel message, singing, and a conclusion advertising the church services. The cost for this length of programme will be £50.00 per week, a total cost of £2600.00 annually."

Rev. David McMillan will have the responsibility of putting these programmes together and doing most of the preaching. But he will receive valuable assistance from other colleagues. LTBS programme director, Rev. Leslie Curran, will produce the introduction and conclusion for the programmes, as well as provide messages and give technical support. Also Rev. Colin Mercer (Mourne) and Rev. John Gray (Enniskillen) will regularly provide messages for the broadcasts. In order to produce these programmes, the Mullaglass church has obtained various pieces of recording equipment and computer software. These include a mixing desk, a high quality microphone, and a software editing package. The church is indebted to Mr. John Palmer of Magherafelt, who provided some of this equipment free of charge. There is a strong possibility that LTBS will be able to air a further programme on the same station. LTBS is delighted with this new opportunity and knows that God's word will not return unto Him void. We look forward to hearing of God's blessing on this another advance in the work of LTBS.



terian Church has successfully negotiated terms with a radio station that operates a little distance from the city of Newry. This station transmits into Northern Ireland, and there are plans to increase the transmitter power and cover an extended area across the province. The minister of Mullaglass church, Rev. David McMillan, recently outlined the reasons for this venture:


